The Indian Removal Act is signed. This act allows the government to give Native American groups land in the west after taking their current lands.
Thousands of Native Americans are forced to move west. Approximately 15,000 of them die during the journey.
The Compact lays the groundwork for the later removal of Native Americans from their lands by the U.S. government.
The United States purchases the Louisiana Territory from France. The government begins to encourage Native Americans to move into this land.
The Cherokee declare themselves a sovereign nation, but are not recognized as such by the state of Georgia.
After the Second Creek War, the U.S. government removes Creek Native Americans from Alabama and sends them west.




