
Look at the pictures of the reefs below, and read the descriptions of the three main kinds of reefs. Match each picture with its proper description. Write your answer in the box next to each picture.

The Great Barrier Reef is home to many unique creatures. Research online and in the library to learn more about a creature that lives in the Great Barrier Reef. Then, use the information you learned to write a descriptive paragraph about the creature.

A descriptive paragraph is a group of sentences that describes a noun. A noun is a person, place, or a thing. To write a descriptive paragraph, you will need many describing words. Describing words are called adjectives.

A descriptive paragraph has three parts. The first part is the topic sentence. The topic sentence is usually the first sentence. It tells readers what the paragraph will be about and catches their attention. Supporting sentences generally follow the topic sentence. They provide details explaining or supporting the topic sentence. At the end of a descriptive paragraph, a sentence wraps up, or summarizes, the ideas expressed in the paragraph. This is called the concluding sentence. It is usually a strong sentence.




