

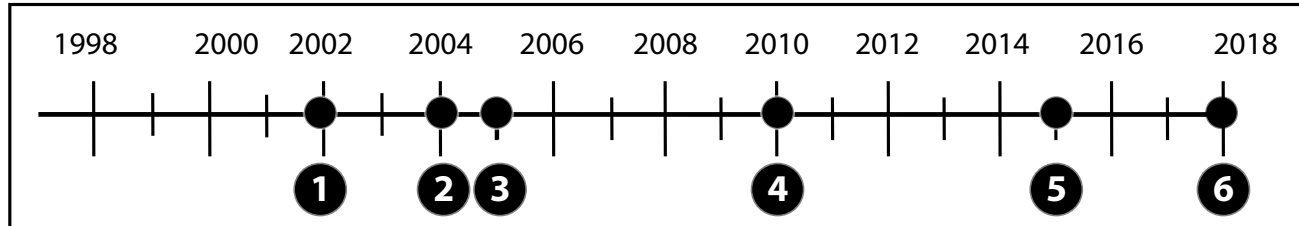

Three days into a trip from Cape Cod to Bermuda, Willie and Amanda Thorns, along with friend Dennis White, ran into rough seas. Willie was ripped from the boat. Amanda and Dennis drifted for 12 days before being rescued by a passing oil tanker.

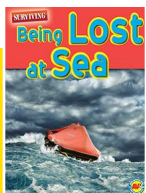
Richard Van Pham ran into a storm during a trip down the California coast. His ship badly damaged, he drifted for about 4 months before being found.

Louis Jordan's fishing trip off the coast of South Carolina became a fight for survival when his boat capsized in rough waters. Surviving on rations, rainwater, and fish, he was rescued after 66 days at sea.

Teenager Aldi Novel Adilang was set adrift when his fishing hut became untethered due to strong winds. He was at sea for 49 days, drifting all the way from Indonesia to the waters off Guam. He was rescued when he was able to make radio contact with a passing ship.

Ari Afrizal was swept into the Indian Ocean during a tsunami in Indonesia. He was found 15 days later, floating on an abandoned fishing raft.

A 3-day fishing trip became a 9-month ordeal when the crew ran out of fuel off the Mexican coast. The boat drifted more than 5,500 miles (8,851 kilometers) before being rescued.
