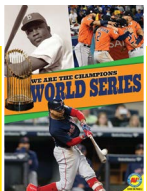
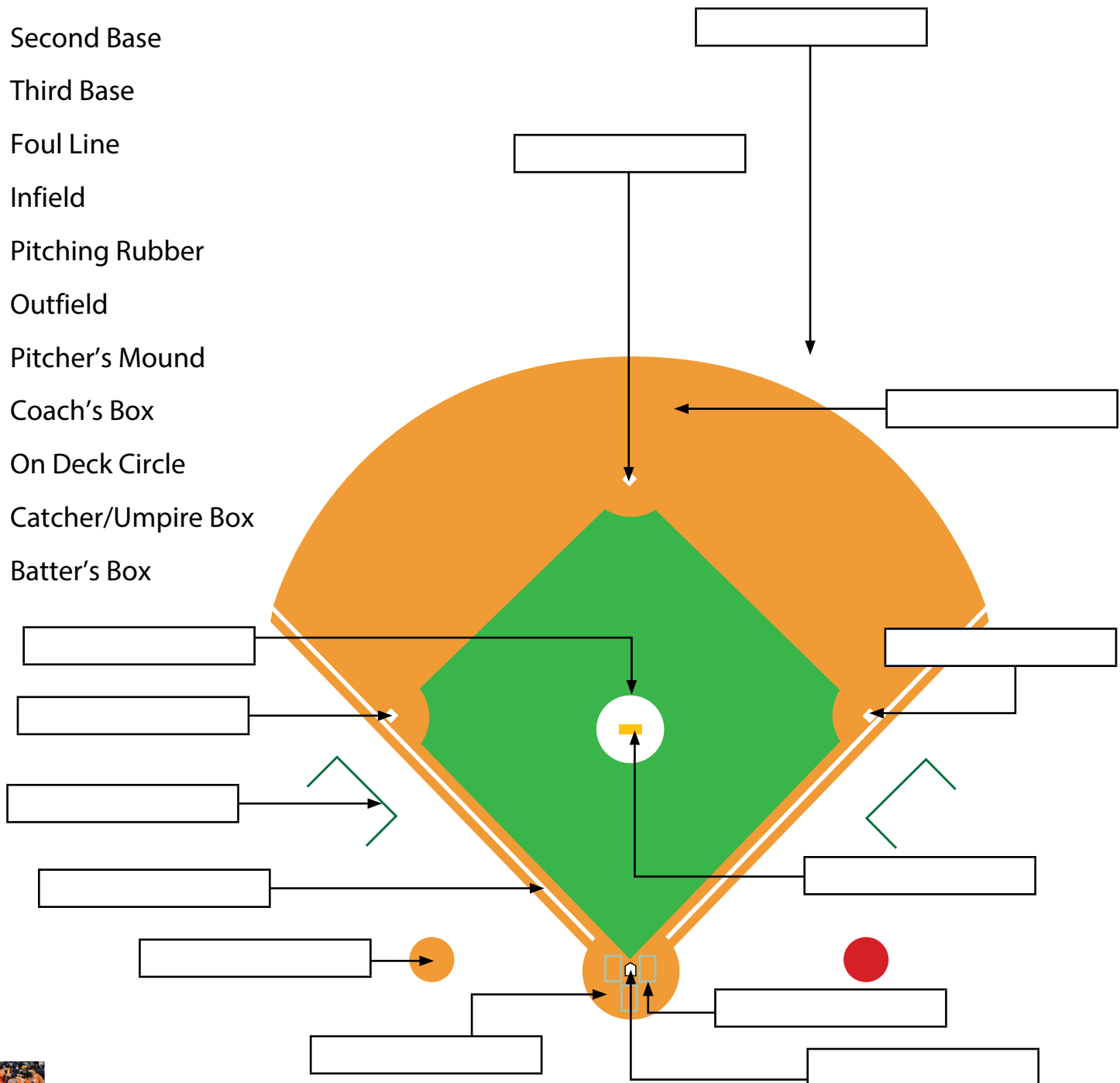

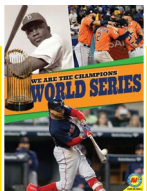

News stories focus on a specific event and date. If there is more than one side to the story, be sure to present each side. Your story should include the answers to the following questions.

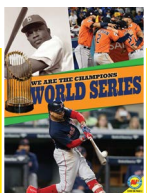
1. Who is the story about? This may be a person, group, organization, or company, for example.

5. Why is the event important? Explain what makes the event relevant. How did the event impact people or the community?



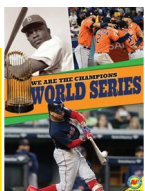
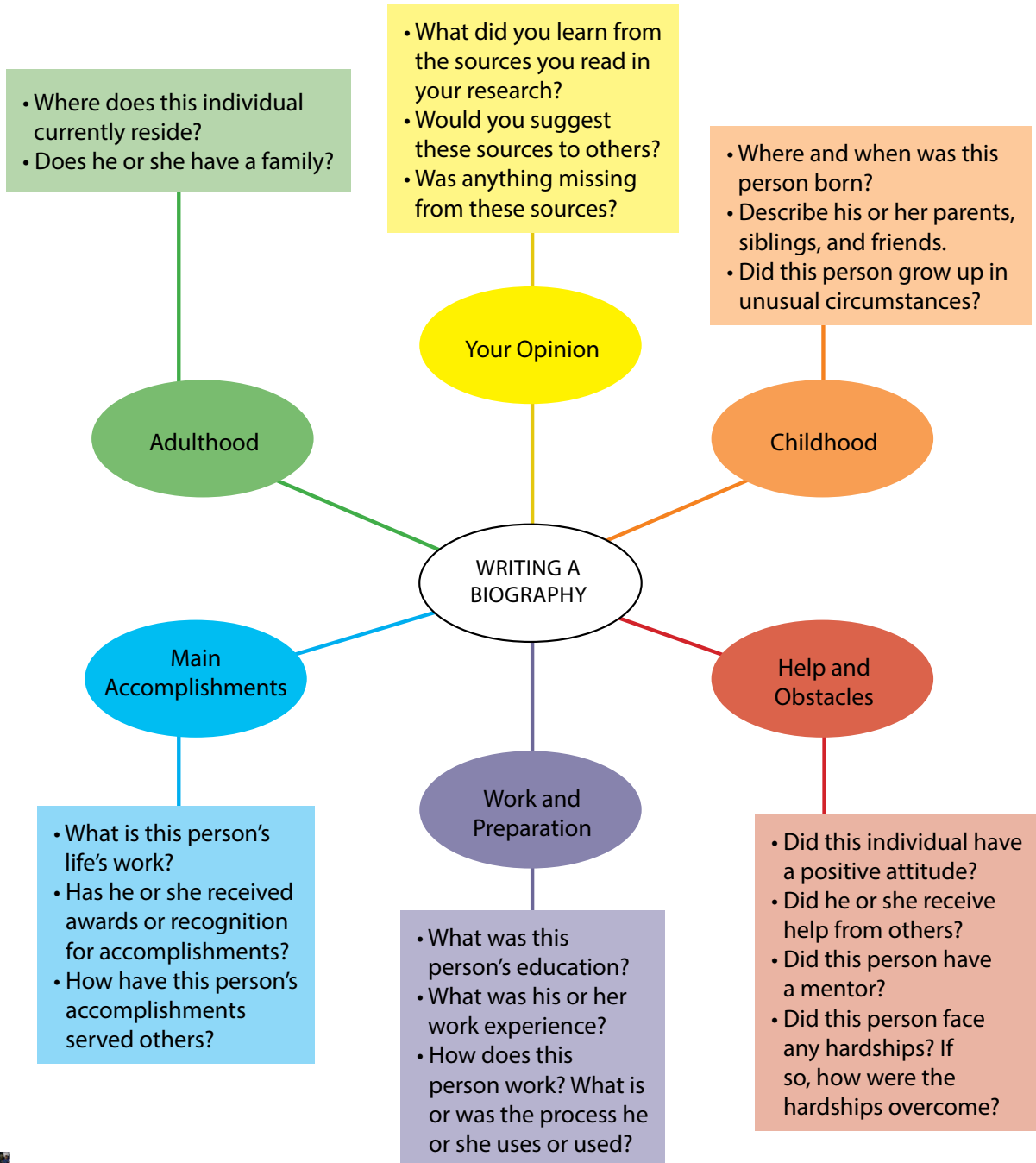

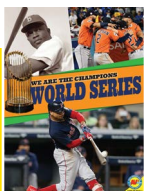
